The special touch given by World Central Kitchen is the focus on preparing food familiar to the people in that region, comfort food from recipes of local chefs.

WOMEN OF THE MONTH:

Our Woman of the Month is a native Californian and grew up close to Modesto near the area where her mother was also raised. Her father, a World War II veteran, and mother settled in Gustine, where she could walk to Elementary school and attend High School. There she enjoyed Student Council and Spanish Club and was one of 70 graduates. She went on to the College of Holy Name, in Oakland CA, where she received a Liberal Arts Degree. After graduating in May of 1967, she married Jim, who she has been happily married to for 55 years. In 1970, while working at the Boise Cascade Paper Co., as an Executive Secretary, she became pregnant. She was let go and sadly could not get unemployment benefits. Three years after Kimberly was born, her daughter Jill arrived soon after she got to the hospital in Santa Fe.

In 1976 her husband, Jim, was transferred by Penny's to southern CA. where they bought a home in Mission Viejo. There her girls went to school and she stayed home until she got a part time secretarial job in Tustin. In 1995 our WOTM started her own bookkeeping business where she happily counseled small business owners with her expertise. She retired after 30 years of running her own company and was able to help Jim make major improvements to their Mission Viejo home.

Family means everything to our WOTM and she takes great pleasure spending time with her husband, daughters and grandchildren. They get together regularly nearby or at their mountain cabin in Los Padres National Park. She and Jim enjoy cruises and have traveled to Alaska, Canada, Costa Rica, Aruba, Hawaii and the Panama Canal. They have also enjoyed several excursions to our National Parks in CA, AZ and Utah.

Many years have been devoted to her Reading and Knitting Groups. She shares her love for knitting by often making blankets for Mission Hospital or hats for Military men and women. She is proud to be a member of the Laguna Niguel Women's Club and to have taken part in our Saddleback Scholarship Committee and our monthly luncheons. Fiction is her favorite genre and she especially liked The Nightingale, The Exiles and The Bourne Identity. Her most memorable movie is Dirty Dancing , as that's the one she and her teen-



age age daughters would put on, and dance along with Patrick Swayze. The person she most admires is her compassionate Girl Scout leader, Betty Miller. She remained in touch with her throughout Miller's life. One thing people will be surprised to learn about our WOTM is that back in 1970, when she was pregnant for the first time, was fired, and denied unemployment, she joined a class action suit against the state of CA. The suit prevailed and CA women were given the benefits they applied for.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAMS:



Advocates for Children: Supports any effort to make sure that children are supported, protected and given the loving care they deserve. This can be both domestic and international.

Arts and Culture: Promotes appreciation of all art forms including poetry, painting, dance, architecture, sculpture and photography. This program also encourages understanding of the rich cultural diversity in our community.

Civic Engagement and Outreach: Highlights and encourages citizenship, crime prevention, safety and disaster preparedness. This program also promotes the education and awareness of domestic and sexual violence in the community and supports the efforts of our first responders, our military and veterans.



Education and Libraries: Supports education and literacy in the community. Provides scholarships for students and supports local schools and libraries in the area.



Environment: Encourages members and the greater community to become stewards of the earth by working to preserve the world's resources, protect wildlife and domesticated animals, live sustainably, beautify our community and enjoy nature.

Health and Wellness: Creates awareness and advancement of the key components of our well being including nutrition, disease prevention, physical and emotional care.

SPECIAL POSITIONS:

Newsletter Editor: Compiles and emails the monthly newsletter. This is a fun job, but must be computer literate. **Publicity:** Advertises and promotes club events that include general meetings, CSP events and fundraisers.

Social Media Editor: Maintains the Facebook page and creates posts that promote the club and it's activities. **Sunshine:** On behalf of the club, sends cards to members to celebrate birthday or express concerns or condolences. Also organizes meal deliveries and rides for members in need.

Website Administrator: Maintains and keeps current our website.

Woman of the Month: Interviews a club member, reads the interview at the monthly meetings so members can guess who it is, and then submits the interview as an article for the newsletter.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES:

Fundraising Committee: Assists the 2nd VP (Ways and Means) with planning ways to raise money for our Club Funds, Philanthropy Funds and Scholarship Funds.

Hospitality Committee: Provides set up and clean up for the monthly general meetings.

Membership Committee: Assists the 3rd VP (Membership) with recruiting and welcoming new members.

Sea Country Festival Committee: Planning committee for our booth at the Sea Country Festival.

Summer Party Committee: Committee members plan the annual Summer Party.

Winter Party Committee: Committee members plan the annual Winter Party

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES:

Bunco: Members meet once a month to play a social, group dice game.

Coastal Walking Group: Members enjoy leisurely hikes at local recreation sites.

Culinary Adventures: For members only who know how and enjoy cooking. Members rotate being hostess, plan a menu, and distribute recipes to the remaining members in the group. Meets 6 times a year.

Gadabouts: Members enjoy a variety of trips to historical or natural sites of interest, monthly.

Girls' Night Out: Members enjoy dinner out, each month, at an upscale restaurant.

Gourmet Evening with Friends: For members and their spouse, partner or guest. Members take turns as hostess, planning the menu, sending out recipes to participants and meeting to enjoy a delicious and fun meal.

Mexican Train: Members meet on the 4th Wednesday evening of each month to play a fun game using dominoes.

Out to Lunch Bunch: Meets monthly at local area restaurants for lunch with friends. Varied days/dates.

Out to Movies Group: Members meet once a month to see a film and enjoy appetizers afterwards.
